IN COMMUNITY

People in community feeding the hungry has been The Gathering's tag line - its motto - for decades. Those six words outline our purpose - feeding the hungry, identify who will do the feeding - people, and describe how that work will be done - in community. That "in community" piece defines The Gathering's methodology, how we put our programs into action, how we serve our meals, how we relate to our guests, how we interact with the world around us. It places an emphasis on interconnectedness, on teamwork, and on building relationships. "In community" provides the foundation for raising up meal guests as volunteers, and for our unrelenting focus on creating a hospitable and welcoming space where everyone is treated with respect and dignity.



Just as "it takes a village to raise a child", it takes an amazing number of individuals, groups and organizations to make certain our guests are served hot, nutritious meals daily - 78,142 meals last year: 149 serving groups; 120 tons (yes, you read that right - TONS) of donated food; vendors who take care of equipment repairs & pest control; half a million dollars donated annually; 98 leadership volunteers providing work otherwise done by paid staff; 4 host sites; onsite collaborative mental health, medical, legal, veterans, housing and food assistance programming. All guided by 3 fulltime and 6 part-time staff.

"In community" means that whether guest, volunteer, donor, vendor, collaborator or staff you are known - often by name, almost always by face. You are trusted to play the role you play with kindness and compassion, and you trust The Gathering to do the same. We are invested in each other over the long haul through good times and difficult ones. Read this newsletter with the words "in community" in mind and you will begin to recognize this work more and more as a conversation and not a onetime event. Thank you for the part you play.




